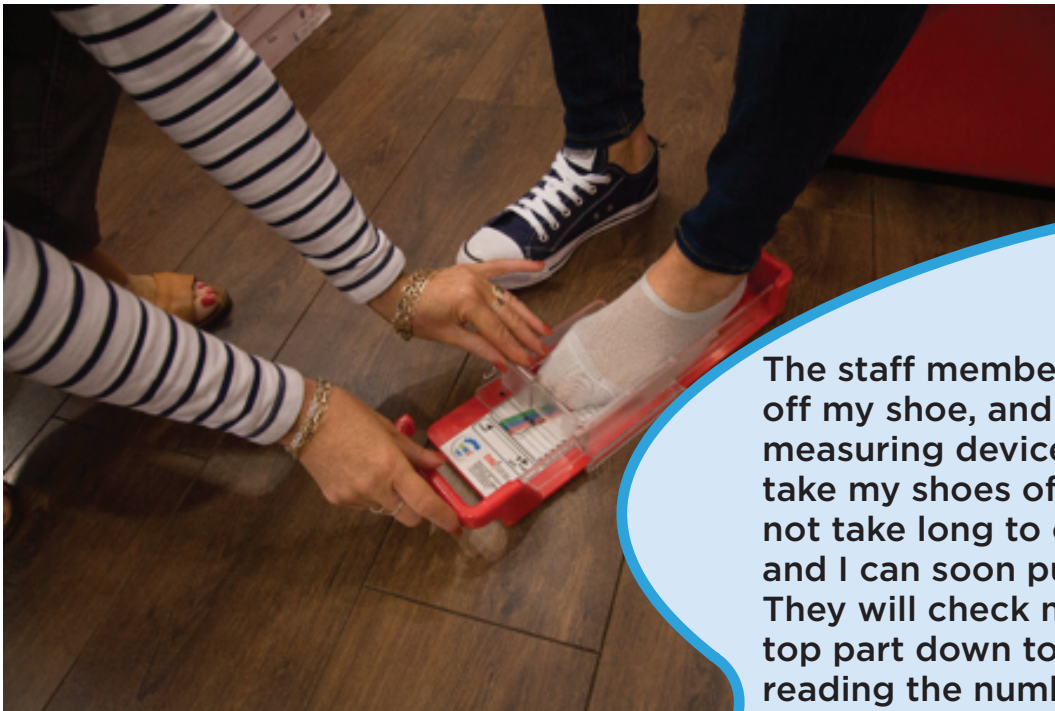
My feet might have grown and my mum or dad might be unsure what my shoe size is. This is ok. Someone working in the shop can help to check my shoe size. They will use a measuring device to check what size my feet are. If I have small feet they will use the white one. If my feet are bigger, they will use the red one

The staff member will ask me to take off my shoe, and put my foot onto the measuring device. I might not want to take my shoes off, but this is ok. It will not take long to check my shoe size and I can soon put my shoes back on. They will check my size by moving the top part down to touch my toe, and reading the number my toe reaches.

Once the staff member knows my size, they can go into the back and check if they have the shoes in stock in my size.

They will then bring the shoes out to me in shoe boxes. I can try them on to make sure they are comfortable.
