in the car park



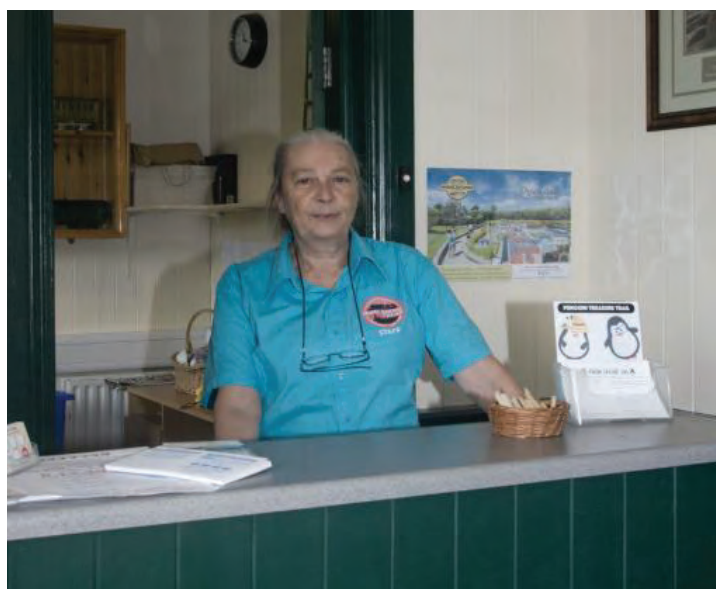
and will follow the

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There are some rules I must follow before entering the pitch.

The rules of the GAA Club are:

I must wear sports shoes

I must wear a sports helmet

I take off my watch or jewellery when practicing sports

No eating or smoking allowed on the pitch

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We must wear a helmet if we are playing 'hurling'.

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My parents can wait for me here. This is called a 'Dug Out'. I can sit here if I need to take a break.

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I will have a coach. He will show me how to use the hurl and play the game. I can ask him for help.

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Sometimes, the coach will blow his whistle. This is a noisy whistle and can frighten me. I do not need to be afraid. He blows his whistle when he needs me and the team to listen carefully.

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There will be other boys and girls on my team and playing the game with me. We will be running and chasing the ball. It will be fun.

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The hurls can sometimes bang together and make a loud noise.

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When training is finished the coach will blow his whistle again. We will go back to the changing rooms and get dressed. Then I will go home.
